Before reading the caption, the somber emotion is clear. Compositionally, Chiu uses every inch of the frame well. Though there is little to no negative space, the photograph doesn't read busy with the neutral uniforms framing the burial flag and selective depth of field. The photo is as beautiful as it is heart wrenching. Chiu's entry stands out for its expertly blended artistry and storytelling.
