WHY HELP THE IRC AT A TIME OF UNMATCHED NEED.

Last year alone, nearly 340 million people identified as being in humanitarian need. In 2014, that number was 81 million people. And with 100 million people forced to flee their homes, the international community must step up. That's where the IRC comes in.

WHAT YOUR FUNDRAISING CAN UNLOCK

Achieve lasting impact by providing health care, helping children learn, and empowering individuals and communities to become self-reliant, while always seeking to address the inequalities facing women and girls.

-  \$30 can provide a hygiene kit that includes soap, a potty with lid, and chlorine to treat water
-  \$110 can help build a water supply system for a family
-  \$200 can provide a family of 6 with coats, hats, gloves and boots
-  \$500 can equip one mobile medical clinic with PPE, trauma kits, and bandages, and critical medical equipment
-  \$1,000 can provide one baby incubator to provide a safe, controlled space for a newborn

FAST FACTS

1.5 million children today were born as refugees.

69% of refugees today come from just 5 countries – all impacted by climate change.

In 2021, the IRC served 31.5 million people in countries affected by crisis.

In the United States in 2021, the IRC served nearly 35,000 people across 28 cities with asylum and protection programs.
