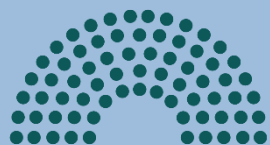

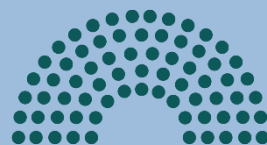

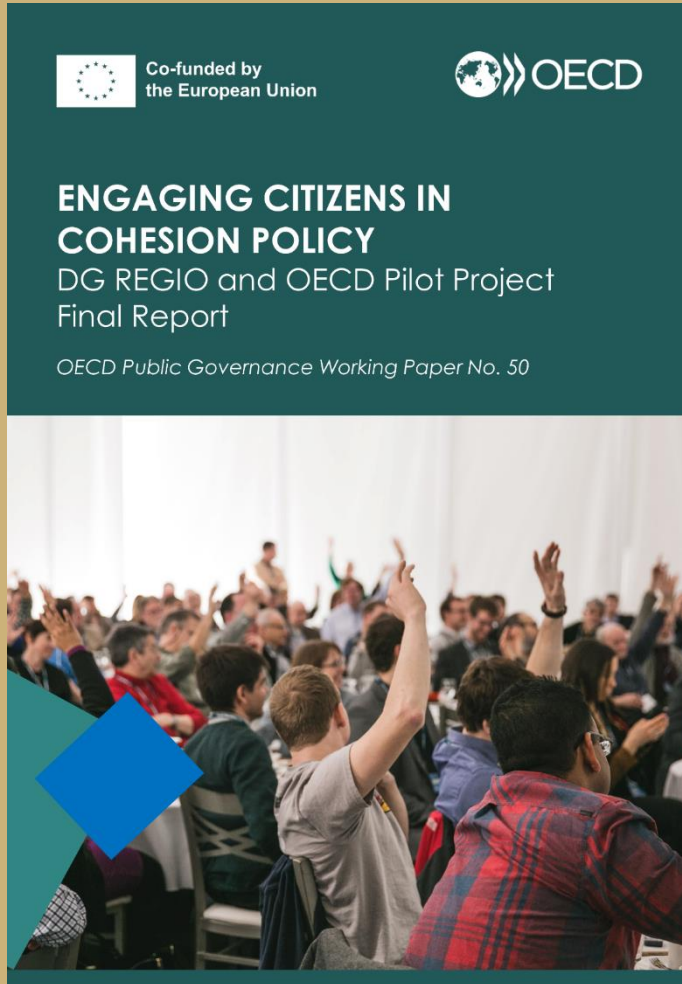

ENGAGING CITIZENS IN COHESION POLICY

DG REGIO and OECD Pilot Project Final Report

Financial grants to CSOs

- Scope of the call:
 - Offer financial support to civil society organisations (up to 25.000 euro, 85% EU contribution) for innovative approach
 - Collect information on how they engage with citizens and public authorities
- Beneficiaries:
 - 18 out of 78 proposals from non-profit private or public organisations were selected
 - Projects started as from November 2020 with a duration of 12 months (few months extension in some cases because of COVID-19)

Outcome

- **To engage with citizens and authorities requires resources:** both time and financial resources are necessary;
- **To reach out to all citizens is not an easy task:** not only young people / students but also ordinary citizens should contribute to design and implement cohesion policy;
- **To reach out to public authorities might be also difficult:** the involvement of relevant authorities make participation effective;
- **To understand the added-value of participation takes time**

Call for expression of
interests

Objectives of the call

- Strategic objectives:
 - Promote cooperation between public authorities and civil society organisation
 - Promote new forms of participation
- Operational objectives
 - Test innovative citizen participation approaches in cohesion policy
 - Identify conditions to build strong and long-lasting partnerships
 - Collect good practices of citizen participation in cohesion policy to be shared among and beyond project partners
 - Promote peer learning and support community of practitioners.

Three pillars of stakeholder participation

As defined in the OECD Recommendation of the Council on Open Government(2017)

1.

INFORMATION

- Initial level of participation
- One-way relationship
- On-demand provision of information
- Proactive measures to disseminate information

2.

CONSULTATION

- More advanced
- Two-way relationship
- Requires provision of information plus feedback on outcomes of process

3.

ENGAGEMENT

- When stakeholders (including citizens + civil society) are given opportunity and necessary resources to collaborate during all phases of the policy-cycle and in service design + delivery

Participation methods

- **Representative deliberative processes** such as Citizen Juries or Assemblies.
- **Co-creation mechanisms** such as hackathons, public challenges or maker spaces.
- **Co-governance arrangements** such as co-operatives, digital commons, or shared spaces.
- **Civic monitoring** such as social auditing or communal evaluation.
- **Open innovation practices**, such as crowdsourcing, hackathons or public challenge
- **Participatory budget** as a mechanism to allow citizens and CSOs to influence public decisions through the direct allocation of public resources to priorities or projects

Eligibility criteria

- Joint application by a public authority and a civil society organisation
 - Public authority (MA/ IB or beneficiary in a programme funded by ERDF, Cohesion Fund or JTF)
 - Civil society organisation (public/private non - profit organisation)
- Relevant national / coordinating body informed by public authority and political support received
- Pre-identified area for cooperation between public authority and CSO (also in selection criteria, i.e. clarity)

Selection criteria –step 1

- Application part 1:
 - Identify **areas** where to implement innovative citizen participation mechanisms:
 - Clearly identify the link between citizens participation and one or more of the five Policy Objectives in your specific context
 - Select a **precise context** where to apply innovative citizen participation mechanisms:
 - Choose the appropriate level programme/strategy/investment and the cycle stage decision making/implementation/monitoring;
 - Define **operational objectives** to reach through innovative citizens participation mechanisms

Selection criteria – step 2

- Interview (online)
 - At least two weeks' notice;
 - Presence of public authority and CSO's representative
 - 30' to spell out motivation and expected support by OECD
- Application (part 2)
 - To be sent to at the latest 4 weeks after the day of the interview;
 - Provide description of project to implement with support of OECD
 - Define the team "public authority & civil society organisation" that will work in the project.
