- 2. Second plea in law, alleging breach of the fundamental principle of protection of property rights:
 - the applicant depositors have been deprived of their property rights as a result of measures adopted by European Union institutions;
 - the applicant depositors have not been granted fair compensation for their resultant loss, in breach of the fundamental principle of protection of property rights;
 - the said breaches were sufficiently serious in that the institutions manifestly and gravely disregarded the limits on their discretion; and
 - there is a direct causal link between the breaches and the damage sustained by the applicants.

Form of order sought

The applicant claims that the Court should:

- annul the decision adopted by the Commission on 20 November 2017 rejecting her complaint related to a request for compensation of the damage suffered by the applicant;
- grant the compensation of the moral prejudice suffered by the fault of the defendant, evaluated at the sum of 10 000 euros and;
- order the reimbursement of the applicant's incurred costs.

Pleas in law and main arguments

In support of the action, the applicant relies on two pleas in law.

- 1. First plea in law, alleging the violation by the defendant of the principle of sound administration and of Article 41 of the Charter on the principle of reasonable delay.
- 2. Second plea in law, alleging the respect by the applicant of the principle of reasonable delay in the submission of the request for assistance.
