

2018 Recruitment Summary Report

Introduction

The purpose of this report is to provide an overall summary of the application process to the 2018 UK Foundation Programme. The report includes total fill rates across all four nations and fill rates for Academic Foundation Programmes (AFP) and Foundation Programme (FP) for individual foundation schools.

Nominations and Applications

The table below provides a comparison of the number of eligible applicants (both UK nominees and those who were deemed eligible by the UKFPO's Eligibility Office), the number of applications for the FP and AFP, the number of unique applicants for the AFP and the number of applicants who submitted two AFP applications for 2017 and 2018.

In total, there were 153 appointable applicants for F1 Stand-alone who did not receive offers during the initial two rounds of offers. This is because the number of applicants exceeded the number of places available.

In total, there were 49 appointable applicants for F2 Stand-alone who did not receive offers during the initial two rounds of offers.

A total of 50 applicants were sponsored for a Tier 2 visa for F2 Stand-alone; 49 by England and 1 by Scotland.

Withdrawal Trends

The overall withdrawal rate from 2013 to 2018 has remained relatively static at approximately 7% with some minor fluctuation.
