HOW THE POLL WAS CONDUCTED AND THE MARGIN OF ERROR CALCULATED

June 23, 2024

The CBS News/YouGov survey of 2,460 adults in the U.S., including an oversample of 743 adults age 18-29, was conducted between June 17-21, 2024.

This sample was weighted according to gender, age, race, and education based on the U.S. Census American Community Survey, and the U.S. Census Current Population Survey, as well as 2020 Presidential vote and 2022 Congressional vote. Respondents were selected to be representative of adults nationwide with an oversample of adults age 18-29. The weights range from 0.1 to 6.8, with a mean of 1 and a standard deviation of 1.

The margin of error (a 95% confidence interval) for a sample percentage p based upon the entire sample is approximately ± 2.8 points and the margin of error for the sample age 18-29 is approximately ± 5.2 points. It is calculated using the formula

$$\hat{p} \pm 100 \times \sqrt{\frac{1 + \mathsf{CV}^2}{n}}$$

where CV is the coefficient of variation of the sample weights and n is the sample size used to compute the proportion. This is a measure of sampling error (the average of all estimates obtained using the same sample selection and weighting procedures repeatedly). The sample estimate should differ from its expected value by less than margin of error in 95 percent of all samples. It does not reflect non-sampling errors, including potential selection bias in panel participation or in response to a particular survey.
