The Washington Post



This Washington Post-Schar School Deciders poll was conducted April 15 to May 30, 2024, among a stratified random sample of 3,513 registered voters in Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin. Results for the overall sample of voters in key states have a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 2.0 percentage points.

A subset of 2,255 voters were classified as "Deciders" if they turned out in only one of the last two presidential elections, are ages 18 to 25, registered to vote since 2022, did not definitely plan to vote for Biden or Trump this year or switched support for party candidates between 2016 and 2020. The error margin for results among Deciders is plus or minus 2.5 points. Questions 14-43 are based on a sample of 3,370 voters and 2,159 Deciders, with error margins of +/- 2.0 and 2.6 points, respectively.

The sample was drawn from the L2 database of registered voters in each state; all selected voters were mailed an invitation to take the survey online, with additional contact efforts from live-caller interviewers, text message and email. The survey's overall response rate was 8.5 percentage points (AAPOR RR3).

Sample design, field work, data processing and weighting were conducted by SSRS of Glen Mills, PA.

This poll was jointly sponsored and funded by The Washington Post and George Mason University's Schar School of Policy and Government. The poll is a stratified random

sample of 3,513 registered voters in Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin.

This questionnaire was administered with the exact questions in the exact order as they appear in this document. Demographic questions are not shown; a summary of sample demographics for each state is in the table above. Phrases surrounded by parentheticals within questions indicate clauses that were randomly rotated for respondents.

The poll employed registration-based sampling, drawing a stratified random sample was drawn from the L2 database of registered voters in each state. The sample was stratified by state, past turnout, ethnicity, age, and rural status to ensure adequate representation of each demographic group.

All selected voters were sent a letter inviting them to participate with a \$1 cash enclosed and invited to take the survey online or by phone, with a \$10 offered for completing the survey. Additional contact attempts were made by live phone operators, email, text message and postcards. In total, 3,388 respondents completed the survey online and 125 by phone. The overall response rate for the survey was 8.5 percent (AAPOR RR3).

Data collection was conducted in two phases. In Phase 1, the survey was conducted with 25 percent of the sample. Following a review of the Phase 1 sample performance in representing target demographic groups, Phase 2 sample design was reassessed to make sure all the various demographic sample targets were reached.

This poll used statistical weighting procedures to ensure the sample is representative and accounts for differential rates of survey participation. The first weighting step adjusts for probability of selection and non-response levels across different types of voters. The second weighting step aligns the survey sample with the population benchmarks for registered voters in each state listed below. Each state sample was given equal weight in the overall survey sample.

^{*}Turnout Deciders are defined as registered voters who are age 18-25, voted in 1 to 3 of four even-year general elections and did not vote in the past three presidential elections, according to turnout records on the L2 voter file.

^{**}L2 is a non-partisan firm that maintains a database of registered voters in each state built using state voter rolls, which include indicators of past turnout and some demographics, such as age, gender and indicators of partisanship (party registration, past primary turnout).

The 143 respondents who did not complete the entire survey but finished a sufficient portion of the survey to be weighted were included in results through Question 13; a single weight was used for the entire sample as results for presidential support did not differ for the subset of 3,370 completed interviews when weighted separately.

All error margins have been adjusted to account for the survey's design effect, which is 1.5 for this survey. The design effect is a factor that takes into account decreases in precision due to sample design and weighting procedures.
